Further Statement

I, \_\_\_\_\_, the undersigned, state in English, that I am an adult unemployed male, with ID No: \_\_\_\_\_ date of birth \_\_\_\_\_ 39 years old, residing at \_\_\_\_\_ Ilitha Park, KHAYELITSHA, cell: \_\_\_\_\_, that:

1. I have previously made statements to the Commission of Inquiry.
2. During the week of 1st November 2012 I received a call from a male police officer who wanted to arrange a meeting between myself and the SAPS Cluster Commander for this area. He said that he had been asked by the Minister of Police, Mr Nathi Mtethwa, to attend to my complaints immediately. The meeting was arranged for Monday 5 November 2012 at 09h00.
3. I went to the meeting with \_\_\_\_\_ N'\_\_\_\_\_ t Khayelitsha Police Station. She asked me how she could help me. She took copies of letters that I had with me concerning previous complaints and

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6. On 8 November 2012, at about 11h23 ' [REDACTED] Ndlovu called me from number 021 360 2301, she asked me whether I had previously lived in Johannesburg and Durban. I asked her why she was interrogating me, and whether I was a suspect or whether she was asking because I had gone to the Commission of Inquiry. She responded by saying that she was merely investigating.

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7. On 9 November I went to one of the Primary Schools in Site C where N works. N told me that she had received several calls from a person at Khayelitsha Police station calling herself [REDACTED]. N told me that the person asked her whether she is friends with me, why are we friends, where I stay and where is N stays. N told me that she felt intimidated by the calls, and that she doesn't feel safe. She only told [REDACTED] where she works and not where she lives for the same reason. N told [REDACTED] not to call her again.

8. N told me that she is afraid for her life, and that I must not give anyone her numbers.

9. I told N that I had not given her number to [REDACTED] and that she must have got the number from a list of previously dialled numbers from the phone that I used at her office. I told N that I would

open a case against the General, and N asked me not to do so as she was afraid that this would provoke the Major General.

10. After I spoke to N, I called Major General [redacted] at about 08h30 on 9 November asking her why she was interrogating people and phoning them. She denied calling N and intimidating her. I told her that the fact that she had called N was recorded on N's call. I told the Major General that I would report her, and I then ended the phone call.

11. The Major General called me back immediately. She asked whether I know who she is. She said she had a right to investigate me. I asked her whether she was asked by the Minister to intimidate me and to harass me. She told me that she was doing her job. I told her that to me she was just an ordinary person who is capable of doing anything. I said that I hope that nothing happens to me or to N.

12. I saw that Major General [redacted] tried to call me again at 11h19 on 9 November, and I did not answer the call.

13. I called Adv Bawa at the Commission of Inquiry, who advised me to come and make a statement at the Commission's office.
